Dear Friends of the St. Louis Public Schools Foundation,

We offer our thanks for your support in positioning the Saint Louis Public Schools District to better serve the needs of students, educators and families everyday.

Despite the challenging times of our day – a mental health crisis; COVID-19; an unpredictable economy; and a fluctuating job market – your collective investment of more than \$2.5 million made a real difference. Together, in partnership with the District, your contributions positioned us to:

- Launch a cohort of 16 pre-K teachers through the Early Childhood Education (ECE) Advisory Committee, a program that empowers educators to design and lead classrooms that better facilitate imagination and literacy.
- Provide more than \$21 thousand in Foundationsupported emergency assistance to 75 SLPS families to remove obstacles at home that far too often inhibit students from being able to attend and meaningfully engage in school.
- Expand efforts to create educator pipelines that support the District in combating attrition rates amid the teacher shortage and mental health crisis.



- Provide professional development training for yet another cohort of 7 school-based teams, focused on embedding distributive leadership practices and programming in their schools, thereby strengthening teacher retention and school culture.
- Create a working draft of a vision for diversity, equity, and inclusion - to be embedded in the District's Transformation Plan 4.0 in the upcoming school year.

Internally, we are also proud to announce that we closed-out the fiscal year with a 'clean' FY22 financial audit.

It is evident that the work to shrink opportunity gaps in the District would not be possible without the generosity of champions for change like you. We look forward to continuing our work with you to drive equitable solutions for all, and promote excellence in St. Louis Public Schools, our region's largest school district.

Health & Wellbeing Program Spotlight

The Family Stability Fund

Students thrive when their material and developmental needs are met. From providing emergency needs assistance, to increasing student and educator access to social service support, your investments in health and wellbeing programming help to eliminate barriers to students' ability to show up, engage, and grow academically in alignment with state standards.

In the wake of COVID recovery efforts, we are highlighting the Family Stability Fund. Through this fund, district social workers are able to identify SLPS students and families with unmet needs, and provide emergency assistance. As a result, traditional risk factors - such as food and housing insecurity, clothing, and transportation needs - are reduced, thereby improving student social-emotional and academic outcomes.

Abrahatzion Habtu, the School Social Worker at Soldan International Studies High School, aims to make a broader impact in the lives of SLPS students and families through this fund.



Recently, Habtu worked with an SLPS family of four, including a single mother of two toddlers and a 16-year-old student at Soldan, to provide temporary housing assistance through the Family Stability Fund.

Despite the mother's steady employment, she was struggling to afford rent, resulting in a three-day eviction notice. Habtu arranged a hotel reservation, granting the children safe and reliable shelter, and alleviating short-term barriers to attendance and achievement. With the help of this fund, the student at Soldan was able to return to school and consistently continue receiving school support services with Habtu.

This is just one example of your investments at work. In FY22, the Family Stability Fund distributed more than \$21,686 to 75 SLPS families - that's approximately \$290/family.



Post-Secondary Opportunity Program Spotlight

Early College Academy

SLPS graduates engage in a path toward upward mobility when they are equipped with the skills and exposures needed to succeed in the college or career of their choice. Not by coincidence, our post-secondary programming runs the gamut between SAT prep, world travel and exploration, internships, and much, much more. At the close of FY22, we wish to take this opportunity to celebrate Early College Academy (ECA).

The ECA Program is a dual enrollment program that enables qualifying SLPS juniors and seniors to take college courses at St. Louis Community College's (STLCC) Forest Park Campus.

Students enrolled in the program work with an ECA counselor to effectively transition from high school to college expectations, through courses and exposures that prepare scholars for life post-graduation. This includes gaining college credits and enhanced academic routines needed to transition into a 2- or 4-year college or university, with an early start toward attaining a post-secondary degree or industry credential.

"As a first generation college graduate, I know how overwhelming it can be trying to navigate all of the postsecondary options out there... whether that be enrolling in college, enlisting in the military, or full time employment."



Kate O'Keefe, the Early College Academy Advisor, is excited to announce that ECA is entering into new heights with eyes on a cohort of 30 scholars in the Spring 2023 semester, in addition to the 60+ students who are currently enrolled.

O'Keefe witnesses the impact of ECA daily, noting that the ECA suite, located on the 3rd floor of Tower G on STLCC campus, is buzzing with life. Students (past and present) use the space "as their home base" to learn about and explore life post-graduation. Success is also reflected in the District's college enrollment rates; over the last 5 years, approximately 60% of SLPS graduates elected to pursue a post-secondary education - that's up 10% from 2019.

Your contributions in post-secondary opportunity programming play an invaluable role in positioning SLPS scholars for post-secondary success. Investments in ECA helped to provide ECA students with free tuition, fees, books, and access to other on-campus resources at STLCC.



Post-Secondary Opportunity Program Spotlight



Early College Academy (Cont.)

When we asked Grace Ebenhoh, a senior at Collegiate School of Medicine and Bioscience (CSMB) currently enrolled in the program, what her motivation was to join Early College Academy, she shared that "ECA is a safe space to adjust to being independent while you're still not quite independent. Because it's such a supportive environment, it's allowed me the room I need to explore what I want to do and figure out... time management skills before I'm on my own in college."

Ilham Matiker, another senior at CSMB enrolled in ECA, agreed with her classmate, sharing that this program has allowed her to explore her academic interests and goals beyond the traditional high school offerings.

Through ECA, Matiker shares that she is able to enroll in "classes that are not offered at my high school - like African American History (From Reconstruction to Present), Black Humanities, Sociology, and Psychology" to gain greater clarity and direction regarding her post-secondary studies.

It's evident that ECA serves to engage SLPS scholars on a path toward upward mobility, and position them for success in the post-secondary opportunity of their choice. When asked to share one takeaway from her experience in the program, Grace shared that "whether you know what you want to do with your future or not, ECA provides a flexible schedule that allows you to branch out into multiple things - like internships, jobs, and clubs - which has helped me so much with studying... getting a job... getting internships... all while learning."

Educator Capacity Program Spotlight

Building the Teacher Pipeline

Educators serve as our most critical partner in the actualization of youth academic achievement and attainment. The St. Louis Public Schools Foundation has partnered with the District to support its efforts to recruit, develop, retain, and scale the impact of effective educators. Your investments help to equip SLPS educators with the skills necessary to provide responsive, academically enriching school experiences that activate student success today and beyond.

For Charles Burton, Chief Human Resources Officer at the District, building a pipeline of invested teachers is personal. A born and raised St. Louisan, Burton is a product of SLPS schools - from Adams Elementary through Soldan High School. He attributes his personal and professional success to the SLPS educators who always believed in, pushed, and encouraged him.

Burton currently faces one of the biggest challenges within the public education space of today: the shrinking pool of qualified educators, due in part to the COVID-19 pandemic. In Missouri alone, there has been a 17% decline in teaching certifications issued between 2019 and 2020 (DESE). While the overall teacher retention rate is 83%, among novice teachers (in years 1-3 on the job), the retention rate drops dramatically to 51%.

To reduce the impact of this teacher shortage, SLPS is implementing several initiatives focused on 'growing your own' teacher pipeline. The core focus of these efforts have to do with ensuring that aspiring educators can realize their own potential, and connect with students by incorporating relational strategies in their everyday instruction.

One example of a 'Grow Your Own' initiative currently being implemented in the District includes a program at Lincoln University that aims to build tomorrow's educator workforce through a pipeline that is specifically aligned to meet the needs and mission of St. Louis Public Schools. Through this two-year program, paraprofessionals are trained in cultural competencies, and standards-based pedagogy, ultimately earning their teacher certification.

Together, we're building a community of impactful educators that can not only provide students with a responsive and academically enriching learning environment, but knowingly activate student success today and beyond.




